### From Pastor Ed...

Dear Friends.

Lent is beginning this month and it can be rather difficult to change our demeanor so soon after Christmas. It's hard, in just a matter of weeks to move from the lights of that season to the darkness of Lent. Part of what makes it hard is that the Lenten stories are, sadly, so much more like life as we know it. There are no bright stars and heavenly angels in our lives most of the time. The stories we remember in Lent are full of the difficult times and feelings that Jesus faced, and that we face in our lives. They are about being severely misunderstood, feeling like a failure, and being hurt by people we love. They are stories about people in power, misusing it for their own ends, at the expense of the poor, and justice, and the common good. They are stories about the kinds of human suffering we are all well acquainted with.

Perhaps another reason the Lenten stories are hard to bear is because of the way we may see God's purposes in them. For centuries, the shape of Lent has been molded by the idea that the events surrounding the cross were the overriding purpose for Jesus' coming. For centuries, the cross has been understood as a bloody payment for the world's sin, *demanded* by an angry God.

However, it is so important to let go of that portrait of God, and Christ's coming to earth. Lent is about *so much more* than the cross. It's about Jesus bringing us a clear picture of God - the God who looks for lost lambs, and welcomes "prodigal" children home, and loves *the world*. It's about Jesus showing us how to live with faith and love and peace and justice, because it's *better* to live that way. It's how God created us to be.

Still, the Lenten stories also show us how to live with the unavoidable sufferings that befall us. They tell us that Jesus "knows our every weakness" because he experienced them, even to death on that cross. Moreover, they tell us that we can make it through the *worse* of times, with faith and love still beating in our hearts, because God provides the strength and grace that we need to get through. Suffering *is* part of life, and it was part of Jesus' life, but one marvelous thing his Lenten story promises us, is that *suffering never has the last word* - and there is always *more life to come*. Alleluia!

### Souper Bowl - 2023

More than 20 years ago, the Souper Bowl of Caring began with a simple prayer from a single youth group: "Lord, as we enjoy the Super Bowl football game, help us to be mindful of those without even a bowl of soup to eat."

Since that day, more than \$60 million has been raised for local charities across the country through Souper Bowl of Caring. It has become a powerful movement that is transforming Super Bowl weekend into the nation's largest youth-led weekend of giving and serving.

At First Pres, we have been collecting canned and boxed food products every year for the past 22 years. All through the month of January our congregation is encouraged to bring their food donations to church each Sunday and place them on the collection display table set in the Narthex. *The collection will culminate on Souper Bowl Sunday, February 12th.* All items are brought to the Food for Friends food pantry where they will be distributed to families in need.

If you choose to make a monetary donation, the Outreach Committee will send those donations to the Food for Friends soup kitchen that operates out of Davis Hall on Saturdays throughout the year. For the last three years, the lunch program was limited to take-out lunches only due to the pandemic of 2020 and the cautions taken in its aftermath. At the start of the New Year, the sit-down dinners will finally resume. The diners will surely welcome back the camaraderie of eating with their friends. For 2022, *The Giving Tree* provided assistance to families by means of gift cards from ShopRite, Target, and Walmart.

As in previous years, the Franklin School nurse was contacted. Casey is new to the position since Barbara retired at the end of school year, June 2022. Casey knew little of the program, but was excited about it after speaking with her, on several occa-

sions, on its concept and past partnership with the school. She reviewed her records and presented us with names of families from the community. Upon requested donations of gift cards from the congregation, we were preparing to provide assistance to seven families.

Due to the generous donations, received from church members, a total of \$1,880.00 in gift cards were distributed to the families by December 18th. Along with the envelope of gift cards, a separate donation provided a 3lb tin of cookies, a bag of oranges, and a ham steak to each family. The Deacons presented a "a comfort throw" to each family as well.

As of December 14th, 93 gift cards were donated: totaling \$2,345.00! Deducting the amount distributed (\$1,880.00), a supply of gift cards totaling \$465.00 remains in place for any need occurring throughout the months ahead.

It is with great pleasure and pride to extend our THANKS! The success of this program only exists because of the participation and generosity of the gift cards donated.

### 2023 Per Capita Assessment - \$40.00

Our Presbytery, The Presbytery of The Northeast, has announced that the assessment of its members on the rolls of its congregations will be \$40.00 for 2023.

The Presbytery of The Northeast is a governing body of the Presbyterian Church USA, which has the responsibility of spreading the Good News that Jesus Christ is the Son of God. Our Presbytery shares its financial and human resources with a regional body called the Synod and a national body called the General Assembly.



A blessing of being a member of a connectional church is that we are able to support the work of our denomination through per capita giving. When we each share, we enable our Presbytery – Synod – and General Assembly to do the creative work of the Holy Spirit throughout the world. In 2022, our Presbytery was instrumental in providing our Church with pulpit supply every Sunday. Under the guidance of Claire Davis from Presbytery, our Interim Pastor Nominating Committee was successful in hiring an interim minister for our Church.

Our church has always been faithful in sending our Presbytery the full amount we are assessed. Each year our budget contains a line item that covers the cost of each member on our role. It is important that each member of First Pres pay their per capita amount of \$40.00. We are prayerful that this year, as in past years, our membership will respond. Young and old members, and all those in between, are asked to use the attached envelope to reflect your response.

Did you know that if you were an Active Member at the end of 2021, you are assessed the 2023 per capita amount?

### The First Presbyterian Church – Rahway, NJ Meatless Cook Book

Does anyone remember this cookbook published in June, 1975?

This cookbook was compiled by the Parish Care and Evangelism Committee of the Session in response to the emphasis on hunger brought to their attention by the Church & Society Committee.

Most recipes were contributed by members of the congregation. Our 50+ year member, Dona MacFarlane contributed many recipes. The cook book even had a recipe from Hellmann's Mayonnaise.

Gladys Whitehead, an active member of the Church until her passing in 2000, recalled that on meatless days in World War I, her

mother often served corn fritters. Her grandmother made "Johnny Cakes" from white corn meal, cooked on a griddle, and served with honey or syrup. She remembered that for lunch, they often had boiled or steamed rice with raisins, served with brown sugar and milk.

### ZION LUTHERAN REOPENING HOMELESS SHELTER

### From Pastor Carmine:

Zion Lutheran Church, Rahway, NJ has used the Fellowship Hall of the Church for the past 10 years as a homeless shelter. Zion's shelter is primarily operated by volunteers from the church and community. Food, entertainment, and services are all provided by volunteers - about 300 of them! We are opening up our shelter again on February 1, 2023!

If you are preparing food, desserts, or drinks for the shelter, a best practice is to contact Pat Ogarek, the church's office administrator, a day or two before you are scheduled to volunteer to get the most accurate head count of how many homeless guests will be in the shelter the night you are volunteering. Pat can be reached by phone at 732-388-1815 or by email: secy@zionlutherannj.net.

Our shelter is a communal space where our guests are fed a hot meal, dessert, and drinks. Our guests sleep on cots. We shelter from 6pm to 7am the following morning where breakfast is served. All of our meals are provided to our guests by the community. We are always accepting donations of food for breakfast - cereal, instant oatmeal, fruit, bagels, donuts, coffee, and tea. Anything easy to prepare!

Zion's kitchen has two ovens and two microwaves, a refrigerator and freezer, a kitchen island for ample counter space, and a two-bin sink. Our homeless guests usually arrive by 6pm and we typically serve dinner between 6:30-7pm. If you would like access to the social hall prior to 6pm, please contact Pat Ogarek (above) and we can open up the hall early for food preparation and set up.

This service is essential in keeping our most vulnerable people from sleeping on the street! This life-saving work wouldn't be possible if it wasn't for you! Thank you for volunteering at Zion, Rahway's Operation Warm Heart Homeless Shelter!


